
Flow With the Snow Robert Tregoning (author), Oliver Averill (illustrator)

Snow lives high on the top of a mountain, but longs to join the clouds she watches as they glide past, floating freely through the air. Then one day, something extraordinary happens. As the clouds part, the sun shines down and Snow finds herself melting. Soon she is whizzing down the mountainside on a journey that will take her to the sea and beyond! Snow's dramatic journey down the mountain, along rivers, though smoky, dirty cities, will capture children's imaginations while this lyrical story is also a fascinating introduction to the water cycle. Suitable for children in nursery and reception.

The Circular Square Simon Philip (author) Neil Clark (Illustrator)

An uplifting, perceptive rhyming story about life's ups and downs, and how those experiences help shape us into well-rounded people. Square used to have FOUR straight sides and FOUR pointy corners, and this made life pretty tough. His corners always got knocked and travelling was an awkward, bumpy ride. Until one day, Square realised that dwelling on those thoughts was far from smart or wise. Instead he pledged to see the positives - like the cooling breeze on summer day. Then, unnoticed at first, Square slowly got rounder and rounder everyday. . . This heartening story is a beautiful, accessible metaphor that shows how our experiences contribute to who we are, and how even though life can be difficult, there is always good to be found. Suitable for nursery children upwards.





Hamza's Wild World Hamza Yassin (Author) Louise Forshaw (Illustrator)

Did you know that cows have over 25,000 taste buds? And that sea stars eat mussels and barnacles? How do sparrow hawks catch their prey? Covering all aspects of animal life, from communication to feeding to learning to the different ways that animals move and sense things, this is jam-packed with fascinating facts. Hamza shares his enthusiasm in a very natural, chatty way, with lots of illustrations and photos. Hamza is dyslexic, as he explains in the introduction, and he wrote this book using recordings of him talking to his editor. Animal-lovers — and any non-fiction lovers — will find it engrossing. Suitable for children in Key Stage 2.

History's Most Epic Fibs! Athena Kugblenu (Author) Nicole Miles (Illustrator)

Fibbing is a part of being human, with some lies being harmless and others damaging. Athena Kugblenu's book explores various fibs throughout history, from trivial ones like the idea that women's dresses don't need pockets, to harmful ones like misinformation. The book discusses fake news, how lies spread online, and teaches children to question information. It includes a "fib-o-meter" to show the severity of different lies, with clear text and fun illustrations to keep the tone light while addressing serious topics. Suitable for children in Years 4, 5 and 6.






The Last Boy Eve McDonnell (author)

Sparked by the true story of George Brewster — the last child chimney sweep — Eve McDonnell's The Last Boy is an outstanding historic adventure about secrets, secrets of the stars, scientific innovation, deep-felt grief and long-held dreams. Brewster has been sold to a cruel Master Sweep to risk his life up the narrow jungle of chimneys to reach the sky. But Brewster has a secret: he's a wizard with numbers and he's predicted a terrifying storm of stars! McDonnell's writing is classy, characterful and splendidly compelling, with a wonderfully inviting premise that keeps on giving as Brewster's magical, suspenseful, big-hearted tale takes flight in illuminating and unpredictable style! Suitable for confident readers in Years 5 and 6.

The Bletchley Riddle Ruta Sepetys, Steve Sheinkin (authors)

A thrilling, historical adventure from bestselling authors Ruta Sepetys and Steve Sheinkin. Remember, you are bound by the official secrets act... It is the summer of 1940. The world is at war. These days, you don't know who you can trust or who might be a secret spy... Maths whizz Jakob Novis has been recruited to the secret codebreaking centre at Bletchley Park. As Jakob works to crack the Nazi's Enigma cipher, his younger sister Lizzie is busy on an undercover mission of her own: to find their mother. Filled with codes to decipher and mysteries to unravel, this is the unputdownable historical adventure that will have you on the edge of your seats! A super and unique book which is perfect for readers in Years 5 and 6.

An author you might not know....




beginner readers. In recent
