




### **Grey** Laura Dockrill (author), Lauren Child (illustrator)

Beautifully crafted compositions together with simple die-cut design, reveal the story of a child who feels as though all their colours have disappeared. Despite the joyful orange balloon, the huge yellow sun and the bright green trees, the child still feels grey. That is until a reassuring hand reaches out and shares words of kindness. Soon the child begins to see the warmth of colour again, and understands that their colours will always be there and that they will always be loved, whether they feel grey or sunshine yellow. Laura and Lauren have created a beautiful book full of empathy and understanding. Suitable for pre-school and Key Stage one children.

## Where Is the Cat? Eva Eland (author / illustrator)

Where is Cat? Where indeed! Cat's quiet, ordered life is disrupted when little Suzy comes to stay, eager to play and determined to find Cat, whatever the hiding place. The pages become a wonderful game of hide and seek for Suzy and the reader, until at last she collapses in tears and Cat leads her for a cosy lie down. Depicted in neon-pinks, green and yellow, Klaus Flugge Prize winner Eva Eland's comic story is full of life and will be instantly recognisable to anyone who has a toddler or a cat. Bold, bright, unmissable and lots of fun! Suitable for children in Nursery, Reception and Key Stage One.





### **Don't Trust Fish!** Neil Sharpson (author), Dan Santat (illustrator)

Have you ever noticed that fish spend all of their time under water? What are they plotting down there? And did you know that a group of fish is called a 'school'? Exactly what are they learning in these 'schools'? We must find answers. But one thing's for sure. Whatever you do: Don't. Trust. Fish. Laugh along as you learn lots of fishy facts from a very suspicious narrator, who believes that there's something more than a bit fishy about fish... Prepare to laugh, learn, and maybe even look at your pet goldfish a little differently! Perfect for children in Reception and up.

## **The Day My School Got Famous** Jen Carney (author / illustrator)

a WWII bomb is discovered at school, Nile is thrilled, and even Ferris gets caught up in the excitement as a design competition is launched to replace the soon-to-be-demolished car park. But as detonation day nears, both boys face growing pressures and must work together to make sure things go off with the right kind of bang. With lively illustrations and plenty of humour, this standalone story also offers a warm, insightful look at the realities of fostering. #### **Shrapnel Boys** Jenny Pearson (author)

From award-winning author Jenny Pearson comes a gripping new novel that brings the Second World War vividly to life for today's readers. For Ronnie Smith, 1939 is full of battles—at school, at home, and now in the skies above London. As bombs fall and danger becomes routine, Ronnie's younger brother starts acting strangely, and Ronnie suspects he's mixed up with a dangerous gang. But when he tries to help, Ronnie uncovers secrets that could change the course of the war itself. Published to mark the 80th anniversary of WWII's end, this is a powerful, pageturning story of courage, family, and unexpected heroism. Suitable for children in Years 5 and 6.

# Pirate Academy – New Kid on Deck by Justin Somper


